R-3-51--Petition of Chase Wiggin, date 1761, who states "That on his return ing home from the army where he was employed all the summer past in the province service was taken sick of the small pox on or about the third day of December last." He presented a bill for expenses of sickness amounting to L 198, 10, 0 old tenor; and was allowed L 7, 18, 9½ sterling. Ed.

R-3-52. Potition of Josiah Wiggin of New Market, who stated that he was a Soldier in Capt. George March's Co., Col. Goff's Reg't., in 1760; came home and had the small-pox, and wanted the province to pay the bill, which amounted to L 188 old tenor. He was allowed L 7, 10, 5, sterling. Ed.

What is now Newmarket and South Newmarket was formerly, and down to the year 1737, a part of Exeter and it's history prior to that date belongs to the annals of the latter town. Newmarket has no official records extending back further than the year 1784. Those records, prior to that date, were seven years since destroyed by fire.

NEWMARKET IN THE REVOLUTION

(Communicated by N.W. Davis, Chairman)

Newmarket gave liberally of her sons in the great struggle for independence and did her full duty toward the accomplishment of that end. She may justly lay claim in an unstinted measure to her full proportionate credit in the foundation and establishment of our great republic, to which cause she maintained staunch loyalty from beginning to end.

Immediately on receipt of the news of the Battle of Lexington her men hastened to the field, and by June 1st, 1775, she had 28 men in the service, well equipped and ready for action. A return made to the Provincial Congress in August 1775, shows that 30 men from Newmarket were in the army at that time.

Her men were present at the battle of Bunker Hill, and took part in practically all the important battles of the war. She was well represented at Saratoga and Newport, and during the course of the war furnished officers to the army to the extent of one Adjutant, six Captains, six Lieutenants, two Ensigns, eight Sergeants and nine Corporals.

One hundred and twenty-two men, at least, whose names and record of service we have, were furnished by Newmarket, and there were undoubtedly several others, of whom, at the present moment, we are without record. How well this number compared with the total male population eligible for service may be seen from the census of August, 1775, when Newmarket had but 212 men between the ages of 16 and 50, which were then age limits for service in the war.

On May 24, 1775, the Fourth Provincial Congress of N.H. appointed Enoch Poor of Exeter, Colonel of a regiment of troops to be raised and known as the Second N.H. Reg't, and on the same day orders were issued to the following persons

Colonel's Poor's Regiment, prior to the Battle of Bunker Hill, was engaged in building fire-rafts at Exeter, guarding the sea-coast from Odiorne's Point to the mouth of the Merrimack, and scouting up and down the river. On the day following the Battle of Bunker Hill the Regiment was ordered to the seat of war, reaching Winter Hill on June 25, where it encamped during the fall and winter and took an important part in the Siege of Boston. The British were forced to evacuate on March 17, 1776, and on March 27th the Regiment was ordered to Long Island constituting a part of Sullivan's Brigade, where it remained but a short time before marching to Canada to join the expedition which had been made into that country under Montgomery.

III CAPTAIN JAMES HILL'S COMPANY* October 19, 1906

On September 1, 1775, the Fourth Provincial Congress voted to raise four regiments of Minute Men by the enlistment of men from the several regiments of Militia. The First Regiment, under the command of Colonel Joshua Wingate, of Stratham, with Jonathan Burnham, Lieutenant Colonel, was assigned to November to the defence of Piscataqua Harbor. The troops were stationed at Portsmouth and Newcastle, and on the islands in the harbor, to repel any attack that might be made from the seaward. The men were mustered in November 5th, and at this time Newmarket furnished her second company, under the command of Captain James Hill.

The following is the roll of Captain's Hill's Company, by which it will be seen that all the officers, and at least 25 of the men, were of Newmarket. It is possible that the entire company was comprised of Newmarket men, although we are without definite record to that effect.

Captain Hill's company was stationed on Pierce's Island, as shown by Colonel Wingate's return to the Committee of Safety in November, 1775, the men being enlisted for four month's service.

CAPTAIN SAMUEL BAKER'S COMPANY

In December, 1776, New Hampshire was called upon for more troops to reinforce the army at Winter Hill. This call was occasioned by disloyalty on the part of Connecticut troops whose terms of enlistment

were about to expire, and who had suddenly refused to remain longer except on the basis of receiving large bounties, notwithstanding they had signified their intention to do so to the delusion of even their own officers. On November 30, 1775, General Sullivan, who was in command of the troops at Winter Hill, wrote to the Committee of Safety as follows:

"I have by command of General Washington, to inform you that the Connecticut forces (deaf to the entreaties of their own as well as all the other officers, and regardless of the contempt with which their own government threatens to treat them on their return,) have absolutely refused to tarry until the 1st day of January but will quit the lines on the 6th of December. They have deceived us and their officers, by pretending there would be no difficulty with them, till they have so near the close of their term, and now, to their eternal infamy, demand a bounty to induce them to tarry only the three weeks. This is such an insult to every American that we are determined to release them at the expiration of their term ~~and find ourselves obliged immediately to supply their places with troops from New Hampshire and Massachusetts Bay.~~

Thirty-one companies were requested of New Hampshire, and the call was no sooner issued than met. It was on this occasion that Washington paid a most magnificent tribute to New Hampshire Patriotism. On December 8, 1775, General Sullivan wrote to the committee of Safety the following.

"General Washington, and all the other officers, are extremely pleased, and bestow the highest encomiums on you and your troops, freely acknowledging that New Hampshire forces for bravery and resolution far surpass the other colonies, and that no Province discovers so much and in the common cause."

These troops were mustered in by Colonel Jonathan Burnham. The rolls of the companies have unfortunately been lost. We have, however, Colonel Burnham's return to the Committee of Safety, showing that Newmarket furnished at this time her third company, consisting of Captain, two Lieutenants, three Sergeants, three Corporals, one drummer, one Fifer and forty-four Privates. The only known officers of the company were:

It is possible that some of the men in this company, as in the case of two of the officers, were enlisted from Captain Hill's Company in Piscataqua Harbor. This was the Fourteenth Company of New Hampshire recruits. The troops served at Winter Hill during the siege of Boston and until the Evacuation of the British, when they were honorably discharged.

IV Friday, October 26, 1906
NEWMARKET IN THE REVOLUTION

In April 1776, was issued the famous Association Test, which amounted to virtually a declaration of independence by the inhabitants of New Hampshire, each town being required to make a return to the Committee of Safety showing the standing of each inhabitant as to his loyalty to the cause of liberty.

This important instrument was sent out in pursuance of a resolution passed by the Continental Congress March 14, 1776, recommending that all persons notoriously disaffected to the cause of America, or who had not associated, or refused to associate, to defend the United Colonies, be immediately disarmed. The following is the text of the resolution:

(In part) Of the citizens of Newmarket over twenty-one years of age, 162 signed this declaration, which is commonly called the Association Test, while those who refused to sign numbered 37.

The signatures were duly affixed and the document returned to the Committee of Safety July 12, 1776, being subscribed by Samuel Gilman, James Cram, and Samuel Baker, Selectmen.

When it is remembered that each signer to this instrument not only exposed his property to confiscation, but his neck to the halter, in case of defeat, the grave risk which each accepted reflects more strongly than any other act the sturdy character of the citizens and their unfaltering devotion to the cause which they espoused.

NEWMARKET MEN IN OTHER COMPANIES--Friday November 2, 1906

Before passing from the military operations of 1775, mention should be made of a small company of Minute Men furnished by Newmarket in November of that year, in addition to the company furnished under Captain James Hill, and which like Capt. Hill's Company, was made up of men from the troops raised by vote of the Provincial Congress, September 1, 1775. Four men, at least, and undoubtedly more, were enrolled at this time under Captain Joseph Parson's of Rye, which made Newmarket's fourth installment of troops furnished in the war.

In addition to this number, twelve men of Captain Hill's Company, including Sergeants Bartlett and Foss and Corporal Colcord, were transferred to Captain Parson's company, so that the roll of the latter, as returned November 22, 1775, by Joseph Cilley, Muster Master, contained the following men from Newmarket.

Captain Parson's company was stationed on Great Island, Piscataqua Harbor, until December 6, 1775, when a part of the company was ordered to Winter Hill, in response to General Sullivan's call for recruits from New Hampshire, to fill the vacancies caused by the retirement of Connecticut troops. This was the twenty-fourth of the thirty-one companies that raised, and as a return of the part of the company left at Great Island shows only Lieutenant Gilman, Sergeant Bartlett, and Privates Folsom, Wiggin, and Pickering, of Newmarket. It seems probable that the remainder of the men served under Captain Parson(s at Winter Hill during the siege of Boston and until the evacuation of the British the following March.

REINFORCEMENTS FOR CANADA

The invasion of Canada, in the winter of 1775-6, proved a failure and resulted in the death of Montgomery at Quebec. The army had been put to rout, and a regiment of New Hampshire Troops, which had been ordered to its relief under Colonel Timothy Bedel, had been disgracefully surrendered in Colonel Bedel's absence. On July 2, 1776, The Provincial Congress voted to raise another regiment, to reinforce the army on the Canadian frontier, and Colonel Joshua Wingate was placed in command. Newmarket now furnished her fifth company of men, twelve in number, who enlisted under Captain Simon Marston, July 1776, and were mustered in Thomas Bartlett, Muster Master of this company; Zebulon Barbor, Newmarket, was First Lieutenant, William Bennett of Exeter, Ensign, and the following men all of Newmarket were Privates:

Captain Marston's company, when enlisted, belonged to Colonel Nicholas Gilman's regiment of New Hampshire militia, but became the Sixth Company in Colonel Wingate's regiment. The company marched on July 22, 1776, destined for Canada. General Sullivan, however, had in the meanwhile made a successful retreat with the remnant of Montgomery's army, and Colonel Wingate's regiment was ordered to join the Northern Continental Army in New York.

CAMPAIGN OF 1777--Friday, Nov.9, 1906

The year 1777 was one of great activity for Newmarket soldiers, and proved a most important one in the history of the war. In that year was fought the great Battle of Saratoga, one of the most momentous events of the war, which, aside from giving to the Americans such a brilliant victory completely set at naught the deep laid plans of the British to disable our arms by cutting off Washington from the eastern states, brought England to a realizing sense of the spirit of the patriots, and gave to Franklin the crowning argument by which he secured from France the recognition of our independence.

In June 1777, an urgent appeal was received by the Committee of Safety of New Hampshire from Governor Cooke of Rhode Island, stating that the enemy, numbering three thousand, were threatening an attack upon that state, and requesting immediate assistance. In response to this appeal a regiment was at once raised and ordered to Rhode Island under command of Lieutenant Colonel Joseph Senter, of Moultonborough,

CAPTAIN ROBERT PIKE'S COMPANY

The First Company of this regiment was placed in command of Robert Pike, of Newmarket, who received his commission June 26. The men were enlisted for six months service. The following is the roll of Captain Pike's company, which numbered fifty-two men, eight of whom, at least, were of Newmarket, and undoubtedly many others, making a sixth instalment of men furnished by Newmarket during the war.

The regiment reached Providence September 12, and reported to Colonel Cornell, who ordered the troops to Warwick on the 14th. Here they built a fort and served on duty guarding the shore. An expedition was planned against Newport to be made on arrival of fresh ammunition, and October 8, the troops crossed the Providence River by night and landed at Warren, proceeding on the 10th to Tiverton and thence to Little Compton, where they arrived on the 14th. The enemy gained intelligence of their design and erected strong fortifications. Two brigades attempted to land, but were discovered and fired upon, one man being killed and one wounded. No further efforts seem to have been made by either side to effect an attack at this time.

NEWMARKET MEN AT SARATOGA

In the Saratoga campaign of 1777, which comprised a number of sharp encounters with the enemy and ended in the taking of Burgoyne's entire army of five thousand six hundred and forty-two men after a series of engagements lasting twenty-nine days, Newmarket soldiers appear to have been well distributed among various companies and regiments, no considerable number being enrolled under any one leader, with the exception of a company commanded by Captain Zebulon Gilman, of Exeter, raised from Colonel Nicholas Gilman's regiment of militia, and an independent company of light infantry which left in September under Colonel John Langdon and joined the army at Saratoga after the fighting had begun.

A return of the men enlisted in 1777 for three years or during the war, belonging to the Fourth Regiment of New Hampshire Militia (Colonel Nicholas Gilman's Regiment), to complete the three battalions of the Continental Army, shows the following men from Newmarket, who served throughout the campaign and experienced hard fighting at Saratoga and in the battles fought in that vicinity:

In the early part of 1777 the three New Hampshire regiments which had been kept constantly in the field were reorganized, many changes being made among the officers, and the regiments themselves changed about, so that in April of that year they were commanded as follows: First New Hampshire Regiment, by Colonel Joseph Cilley of Nottingham; Second Regiment, by Colonel Nathan Hale of Rindge; Third Regiment, by Colonel Alexander Scammel of Durham. These regiments were under the immediate command of General Sullivan and had their rendezvous at Ticonderoga and vicinity until the approach of Burgoyne in July. Of the Newmarket soldiers who had enlisted in these regiments the first of the year we have record of the following, who served in the regiments and companies as shown below:

Captain Hutchins was of Hopkinton; Captain Scott of Peterborough; Captains Norris and Rowell of Epping; Captain Drow of Barrington; Captain Boll of Dover; Captain Robinson of Exeter; Captain Bledgett of Goffstown; Captain McClary of Epsom; and Captain Beal of Portsmouth.

These soldiers acquitted themselves with great honor in the battles of Hubbardton, Bemis Heights and Stillwater, and were in the thickest of the fight. Of their valor we of the present day may be justly proud, Joseph Sanborn was severely wounded in one of the engagements and left at Albany when the army proceeded southward. James Colby was wounded at Bemis Heights, by a musket ball which passed through the right hip. He received a pension from March 17, 1786. The battle of Hubbardton was fought on July 7, Bemis Heights September 19, and Stillwater October 7. The two latter engagements, in conjunction with minor skirmishes which took place on the heights near Saratoga, are generally combined and referred to as the Battle of Saratoga. Colonel Hale was taken prisoner at Hubbardton, and the command of the Second Regiment was given to George Reid, formerly Lieutenant-Colonel of the First Regiment. To the severity of these battles, and the hard fighting which developed upon the New Hampshire troops, the lists of the dead and wounded bear eloquent testimony. Among the officers of these regiments, Major Titcomb, of Dover, was severely wounded at Hubbardton, Lieutenant-Colonel Adams, of Durham, was killed at Bemis Heights, Captain McClary was killed in one of the later engagements, and Captain Bell was mortally wounded at Stillwater. The part taken by the New Hampshire Troops in these battles is mentioned in terms of highest praise by eminent historians. An official ~~document~~ account of the engagements at Bemis Heights and Stillwater states that the three regiments commanded by Colonels Cilley, Scammel and Reid, were conspicuous for their bravery throughout; that when Colonel Cilley first became engaged, so many men fell in twenty minutes that he could save

himself only by falling back on reinforcements, with which the regiment went into the fight again with great spirit and fought till night; that Colonel Scammol fearlessly led his regiment where the fire was hottest.

CAPTAIN ZEBULON GILMAN'S COMPANY

On the Ticonderoga alarm of June 27, 1777, when news was received of Burgoyne's determination to send a force through the New Hampshire grants and subjugate New England, the Committee of Safety called a special session of the Legislature which convened July 17th to 20th. Letters were read from the Council of Safety of Vermont urgently entreating that troops be sent to the assistance of that state. On July 18th the Legislature voted to divide the state militia into two brigades, portions of which should be sent at once to check the approach of Burgoyne. The first brigade was placed in command of General William Whipple of Portsmouth, and the second in command of General John Stark of Derryfield. Colonel Stephen Evans, of Dover, commanded one of the regiments in Whipple's Brigade, and into this regiment was enlisted on September 8, 1777, Captain Zebulon Gilman's company of Colonel Nicholas Gilman's regiment of New Hampshire militia. This company was mustered into service by Noah Emory, Muster Master, September 12th and contained at least sixteen men from Newmarket, including Lieutenant Zebulon Barber, and undoubtedly others. The names of the men known to have belonged in Newmarket were as follows:

This was the eighth installment of men furnished by Newmarket during the war. Captain Gilman was of Exeter. On September 20th the regiment was ordered to Bennington to be placed under command of General Stark, if the latter was still in the service. Stark's men, however, who had nobly fought at Bennington, had returned home at the expiration of their service, and Stark himself had returned to New Hampshire. General Whipple was accordingly given command of all recruits for the Northern Continental Army, and Colonel Evans' regiment served in his brigade at the Battle of Saratoga and until October 26. The regiment was discharged December 15th.

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VIII

COLONEL JOHN LANGDON'S COMPANY

One of the principal figures in the memorable session of the New Hampshire Legislature which was held July 17-20, 1777, to devise ways and means for checking the advance of Burgoyne, was Colonel John Langdon of Portsmouth. It was, indeed, due largely to his unselfish patriotism and willingness to devote his fortune to the needs of the state that the two brigades which were sent to Bennington and Saratoga under Generals Stark and Whipple were raised and equipped. When this important session was called

called the state was practically destitute of funds, and it was the general feeling of the citizens that they had done all that could be done in the way of furnishing troops. The outlook was far from bright when, on the second day of the session, Colonel Langdon, who was speaker of the House of Representatives, arose at his desk and made one of the most effective speeches of the Revolution, as follows: "Gentlemen, I have three thousand dollars in hard money, thirty hogs-heads of Tobago Rumm worth as much, and I can pledge my plate for as much more. These are at the service of the state. With this money we can raise and provision troops; our friend John Stark will lead them. If we check Burgoyne, the state can repay me; and if we do not, the money will be of no use to me."

The funds were raised and Stark went on his way to Bennington. Colonel Langdon then summoned his own Independent Company of Light Infantry, which he had raised and equipped in June, 1776, at his personal expense, and followed to Bennington and Saratoga, reaching the latter place in time to join the army under General Gates and take an active part in the battle. This company, in point of personell and military training, was undoubtedly one of the finest and most efficient that ever left New Hampshire, being comprised, as it was, chiefly of officers and leading citizens of the state. Fifteen of its members, including Ensign Hill, were of Newmarket, which made the ninth instalment of men furnished by Newmarket during the war. The company entered service September 29th and remained at Saratoga until October 31st, when it was discharged, the men being allowed for thirteen days travel home, a distance of two hundred and sixty miles.

After the battle of Stillwater Burgoyne intronched his army in the heights near Saratoga, on the site of the present town of Schuylerville, where he remained until his surrender, October 17th. On the afternoon of the 16th articles of capitulation were signed, allowing the British to march out with drums beating

march out with the drums beating and the honors of war, which they did on the following day. An interesting account of our troops as they appeared to one of the British is given in an article by Rear-Admiral Foster in the current issue of the "Granite Monthly". As we read these lines we are carried back one hundred and twenty-nine years and brought face to face with our soldiers as they stood on that memorable day, and our pride is not lessened as we see vividly before us the characteristics of our men and their quiet and unostentatious mien even in the hour of great triumph. The account reads as follows:

"I shall never forget the appearance of the American troops on our marching past them. A dead silence reigned through their numerous columns. Not one of them was uniformly clad. Each had on the clothes he wore in the fields, the church or tavern; they stood, however, like soldiers, well arranged and with a military air, in which there was little to find fault with. All the muskets had bayonets and the sharpshooters had rifles. The men all stood so still that we were filled with wonder. Not one of them made a single motion as if he would speak with his neighbor. Nay, more, all the lads that stood there in rank and file, kind nature had formed so trim, and so slender, so nervous, that it was a pleasure to look at them and we were all surprised at the sight of such a handsome well-formed race. The whole nation has a natural turn for war and a soldier's life. The generals wore uniforms, and belts which designated their rank, but most of the colonels were in their ordinary clothes with a musket and bayonet in hand and a cartridge box or powder-horn slung over the shoulder."

NEWMARKET MEN AT VALLEY FORGE

Immediately after the surrender of Burgoyne, the three New Hampshire Continental Regiments, under command of General Poor, in whose brigade they had fought so gallantly and with such signal success in the battles of Saratoga, were dispatched by forced marches to Albany, in order to secure that important point before it would be occupied by General Clinton, who had started northward from New York and was taking everything before him. The brigade marched forty miles and forded the Mohawk below the falls in fourteen hours. Clinton, however, upon hearing of Burgoyne's defeat, returned to New York, and on November 11th our troops made preparations to march to Pennsylvania. They reached Peckskill on the 15th, Morristown on the 17th, crossed the Delaware on the 20th and joined the main army under Washington at Whitemarsh, a short distance north of Philadelphia. On December 19th the entire army went into winter quarters at Valley Forge.

A Size Roll of the Absentees from the three New Hampshire regiments, dated at Valley Forge, January 10th, 1778, shows the following Newmarket men, with ages and notations as given below:

The word "deserted" was used with great freedom in Revolutionary times and does not necessarily mean that the soldiers were actually deserters. It is found in numerous cases where men were delayed in returning from furloughs.

So far as known, the remainder of the Newmarket men who had enlisted in these regiments in 1777, numbering at least thirty-one, and probably more, spent the winter at Valley Forge and bore their share of the privations which befell the American army during that gloomiest period of the war. The hardships and suffering of that terrible winter are too well known to be more than briefly mentioned here. It can be said in all truth that the accounts which we have are not in the least overdrawn, but fall far short of describing fully the awful conditions that prevailed at that time. We catch glimpses of the situation through letters written by Washington, LaFayette and Poor, and the details are too harrowing to record. By the middle of December nearly three thousand men were reported by Washington as unfit for duty on account of being barefoot or otherwise naked. Horses died by hundreds of starvation; the men sustained life with flour and water, and had only the frozen ground to sleep upon. Benumbed with cold and enfeebled with hunger, sickness and death spread through the troops with fearful rapidity. General LaFayette afterwards wrote, "The army frequently remained whole days without provisions, and the patient endurance of both soldiers and officers was a miracle which each moment served to renew," warm indeed must have burned the fire of patriotism not to have flickered under such trying circumstances. The New Hampshire camp was at the extreme west of the main encampment, and the best that can be said of our troops is that they suffered no more than the others.

CAPTAIN EDWARD HILTON'S COMPANY, IN SECOND EXPEDITION TO RHODE ISLAND

In the summer of 1778 New Hampshire was called upon to furnish more troops for Rhode Island, in addition to four companies which had been sent there in the spring of that year to replace Colonel Senter's troops, whose term of service had expired. This call was occasioned by the presence of a strong British force at Newport under General Pigot. Newmarket furnished her tenth company at this time, under command of Captain Edward Hilton, in Colonel Joshua Wingate's regiment. The company was enlisted August 6th, and took part in the Battle of Newport. The following is the roll of Captain Hilton's Company, by which it will be seen that at least eight of the men, besides Captain Hilton himself, were of Newmarket, and probably others:

The Americans had planned a joint attack against the British with the French fleet under Count D'Estaing, and Generals Green and LaFayette joined General Sullivan and took part at Tiverton. Arrangements were completed on August 9th and the attack was to be made the following day. On the morning of the 10th, however, the British fleet under Lord Howe came in sight and the French fleet was compelled to leave the island and engage it. A storm parted the two fleets, and on one put in at Boston while the other sailed for New York. General Sullivan had laid siege to Newport, but deprived of the fleet was obliged to withdraw. The British pursued and overtook the Americans on the northern part of the island, where a sharp battle ensued and the British were repulsed with a loss of two hundred and sixty men. This battle, which was fought on August 29th, was pronounced by LaFayette "the best fought action in the war."

 NEWMARKET IN THE REVOLUTION
 BATTLE OF MONMOUTH

To follow the course of the Newmarket soldiers who were still in the Continental service during the years 1778 and 1779, we have only to trace the activities of Poor's brigade, which contained during that period the three New Hampshire Continental regiments commanded by Colonel Cilley, and Reid and Scammel.

The opening engagement for 1778 took place at Barren Hill, Pennsylvania, an eminence situated about half way between Valley Forge and Philadelphia, which the brigade was ordered to occupy, with other troops under command of General LaFayette, on May 18th. The British laid plans to surround and capture our troops, in which they were very nearly successful. An attack was made by a force of more than double that of LaFayette, and the Americans were obliged to retreat with a loss of nine men.

The British returned to Philadelphia, and on June 18th General Clinton with his entire army evacuated that city and set out for New York. Washington sought to impede his progress by burning bridges and obstructing the roads, and endeavored to engage him in battle. A series of skirmishes took place, which led to the battle of Monmouth. This engagement was fought on June 28th, and would have resulted in a splendid victory for the Americans but for the treachery of General Lee. The British were allowed to escape, leaving the Americans in possession of the field, and joined their forces in New York. Poor's brigade, which was in General Lee's division, was most active in its efforts to retrieve the day, and received the special probation of Washington. The British loss was about fifteen hundred, five hundred of whom fell at Monmouth.

During the remainder of 1778, with the exception of the Rhode Island campaign, no extensive operations took place in the North. The army was stationed so that it could be easily concentrated and at the same time restrict the British in securing supplies. The troops were quartered during the winter in well posted detachments about New York, the New Hampshire regiments being encamped near Danbury, Connecticut.

SULLIVAN'S EXPEDITION AGAINST THE INDIANS

In 1778 the Indians of the "Six Nations," who had been incited to hostility by the British, joined with the Tories of upper Pennsylvania and New York and descended upon the settlements in the Mohawk and Susquehanna valleys, committing the most barbarous atrocities, scalping their victims and burning their homes. Expeditions were sent against them, but proved of no effect. In July occurred the Wyoming massacre, and in November Cherry Valley was attacked, at which time forty-three persons were butchered, including men, women, and children.

In 1779 the depredations continued, and Washington determined to put a stop for all time to these wanton cruelties, by sending a sufficient force

against the Indians to devastate their country and destroy their villages. About five thousand men under General Sullivan were chosen for this purpose, including Poor's brigade, which constituted the right wing of Sullivan's army. The New Hampshire troops were at Peekskill in April, and in May had marched to Easton, Pennsylvania. On May 23rd Colonel Gilley's regiment marched for Wyoming, and on June 17th the remainder of the troops followed. The Indians were overtaken on August 29th and the battle of Newtown was fought. General Poor was ordered to gain the enemy's rear, and in so doing encountered some six hundred savages. A sharp fight ensued, in which twenty of the enemy were killed. The Indians fought from tree to tree until our troops gained the summit of the hill and captured their stronghold, when they fled in disorder.

A historian of the expedition has said, "The boldness of its conception was only equaled by the bravery and determination with which its hardships and dangers were met and its objects accomplished"; and of the part taken by Poor's brigade General Sullivan wrote, "General Poor, his officers and men, deserve the highest praise for their intrepidity and soldierly conduct."

The troops returned from the expedition late in the fall and went into winter quarters with the main army at Morristown, New Jersey.

ENLISTMENTS IN THE 1780

In 1780 the three New Hampshire regiments were still in the field as formerly, serving part of the time at West Point and subsequently marching into New Jersey. Recruits were called for during that year, and the following is a roll of Newmarket men who enlisted in July, for service until the end of the year, to complete the three regiments of the New Hampshire line:

This was the eleventh instalment of troops furnished by Newmarket during the war. The men were mustered at Kingstown, July 6th, by Josiah Bartlett, Master Master, and allowed for eighty-nine miles travel to Worcester, for which they set out at once, proceeding thence to Springfield, where they were met by proper officers detailed for the service, escorted to West Point, and mustered in at camp by Major Williams Scott on July 12th.

In addition to the above, Newmarket undoubtedly had her usual number of veterans in the service during that year, and as two additional regiments were furnished by the state for the defence of West Point, it is quite probable that her quota of men was considerably augmented by these. The records of these troops are missing.

1781

The returns that we have for the year 1781 show that Newmarket had the following men in the field, which is probably but a small proportion of her troops who were actually in the service at that time. The records for that year, as in 1780, are very meagre, and the service as given is necessarily incomplete:

During that year part of the New Hampshire troops were stationed in New York, while part went into Virginia and were present at the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, where the gallant Scammell lost his life.

THE RANGER SERVICE

For the greater part of the war, from 1776 to 1781, several battalions of rangers were kept in the northern part of New Hampshire for the protection of our frontiers, and Newmarket had at least one soldier in this service, Philip Crommet, who enlisted as private in Captain George Aldrich's Company, Major Benjamin Whitcomb's Independent Corps of rangers, and served from December 2, 1776 until some time during the following year, when he entered the Continental Service being among the troops raised for three years, or during the war, to complete the three New Hampshire regiments of the Continental line. Major Whitcomb's battalion was ordered in the fall of 1776 to the upper Connecticut, and did frontier duty in that vicinity, and in the Coos Country, until 1781.

GENERAL WASHINGTON'S GUARD

Perhaps one of the highest honors that could be conferred upon a private in the Revolutionary army was that of membership in the Commander-in-Chief's Guard, or, as it was called by the soldiers, General Washington's Body Guard. Newmarket was represented in that honorable body by at least one soldier, William Glidden, who enlisted June 22, 1778, as private in Captain James Duncan's Company, Colonel Moses Hazen's Regiment of Independent Volunteers. This regiment, which was composed of New Hampshire men, Canadians and Indians, was organized in January, 1776. Colonel Hazen was a native of Massachusetts, but had served in the French and Indian War and at its close had settled in Canada, residing there until 1776, when he received his appointment from Congress. This regiment belonged to no particular state, and was called "Congress's Own Regiment," William Glidden's service extended until the close of the war, during part of which time, if not all, with other members of his regiment, he was attached to the Commander-in-Chief's Guard. This guard, which commanded throughout the war by Major Caleb Gibbs of Massachusetts, was with Washington at all times, wherever he made his headquarters, and participated in the battles in which he engaged. It was organized at Cambridge, March 12, 1776, for the protection of his person, and valuable papers which were always in his possession, and served until the dissolution of the army in 1783. Its members were specially chosen from the various regiments for their patriotism, fidelity to duty and military bearing. It was considered by the soldiers a mark of particular distinction to be a member of this Guard, and it could be said at all times to contain the pick of the American army. A detachment from it prevented Washington from being kidnapped in New York in 1782. The guard was comprised of three hundred and thirty-nine officers and men, who were chosen from the troops of each of the thirteen states. Of this number, New Hampshire furnished forty-nine.

NEWMARKET MEN IN THE REVOLUTION
NEWMARKET MEN AT BUNKER HILL

We have deferred to this time, in order to make further research, the account of Newmarket's share in the glory of Bunker Hill. That the town was well represented in this, as in all other important battles in which New Hampshire troops were engaged, is beyond all question of doubt, but owing to the dearth of records covering this early, and, to the New Hampshire troops, opening engagement of the war, our search has been attended with greater difficulty and less apparent success than that of any other period in the Revolution, and we are unable at the moment to give more than a meagre account of Newmarket's part in the events of that memorable 17th of June, 1775.

Hardly had the smoke cleared away from the battles of Lexington and Concord before men were hastening to Cambridge from all parts of New Hampshire and each of the towns in the southern portion of the state sent more or less men according to population. A party of about one hundred left Nottingham and vicinity, one of similar size went from Durham, and on the morning of the 20th one hundred and eighty men marched from Exeter. Each of these parties included men enlisted in Massachusetts regiments after reaching Cambridge. It is a source of profound regret that no complete lists of these early patriots have been preserved, and for their names and service we are to a large degree dependent upon town and family records.

The war rolls afford us the names of two who participated in the battle of Bunker Hill, and as we proceed with the collections we shall expect to be able to add many more. The two, of whose services we have record, were Israel Gilman, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Third New Hampshire Regiment, commanded by Colonel James Reed; and Reuben Roberts, private in Captain Jeromiah Gilman's Company, Colonel John Nixon's Regiment, which was a Massachusetts regiment. Both of these men were on the hill and engaged in the thick of the fight.

Of the part taken by the New Hampshire troops in this historic battle, the most notable, perhaps, in the annals of American history, the accounts vie with each other in their efforts to express the highest praise. On June 12th Colonel Reed was ordered to quarter his regiment on Charlestown Neck and keep all necessary guards between his barracks and the ferry, and on Bunker's Hill, which the Americans intended to fortify. The battle, however, was really fought on Breed's Hill, which was next beyond Bunker's Hill. On the morning of the 17th a part of Stark's regiment was ordered to the hill, and in the afternoon the remainder of Stark's regiment was ordered to the hill and the whole of Reed's regiment followed. The New Hampshire line was stationed at the now famous rail fence, which extended between the redoubt and the Mystic River, and the British who received their fire were almost totally annihilated. These were the Welsh Fusiliers, a veteran regiment that had seen much service, and the flower of the British Army, and historians are agreed that if the other parts of the American line had been defended with equal bravery the British would either have been driven from the field or completely destroyed.

When the Americans made their retreat the main body in the redoubt would have been effectually cut off but for the unfaltering courage of the New Hampshire troops, who held the enemy in check until they had left the hill. Ninety-six of the British were killed in the immediate vicinity of the rail fence, and the Americans had fifteen killed or mortally wounded in Reed's regiment alone. As a striking example of the valor of the New Hampshire soldiers, which characterized her troops throughout the war, it is of interest to relate that when the men under Stark and Reed were ordered to the hill, regiments which had preceded them had come to a halt, in consequence of a raking fire from the British troops ships. Major McClary, of Stark's regiment approached their commanders and asked if it were not their intention to move on, requesting them, if not, to kindly open their ranks and allow his regiments to pass. This they immediately did, and the New Hampshire troops marched deliberately up the hill in the face of the British fire.

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BATTLES OF TRENTON AND PRINCETON

Colonel Poor's regiment, during the year 1776, undoubtedly contained as many men from Newmarket as in 1775, and possibly the number was increased, although many had been transferred to companies other than those in which they had enlisted. As the rolls for that year are missing, we are unable to give the names of the men who were still in the regiment at that time. In a return of Deserters and Sick Absent, however, dated at Chimney Point, near Crown Point, on Lake Champlain, July 8, 1776, we find the following men from Newmarket.

It is unlikely that any of the three men mentioned as deserters really gave up the service in the army. One of them, in fact, Zebulon Doe, was in Colonel Joshua Wingate's regiment that very year. In November Colonel Poor's regiment, which had served at Crown Point and Ticonderoga during the summer, was sent to reinforce the Continental Army in New Jersey. The troops joined Washington in December, were with him on the eventful occasion of his crossing the Delaware, and participated in the battles of Trenton and Princeton. The former took place on December 25th, when the Americans made a magnificent capture of one thousand Hessian troops, and the latter on January 3rd, 1777, when the British under Cornwallis were completely put to rout. These brilliant victories came at a time when the American cause had begun to seem hopeless, and their effect was electrical throughout the country and created fresh enthusiasm among the soldiers. On January 7th the army encamped for the winter at Morristown.

INDIVIDUAL SERVICE

The following is a record in detail of Newmarket's Revolutionary service, in so far as we have been able to obtain the same to the present time, with the names of the soldiers, for convenient reference, alphabetically arranged. The record is of necessity incomplete, as we are without the service of Captain Baker's Company at Winter Hill, are unable to credit many of the men who were in the Continental Regiments after 1776, are without the names of any who may have enlisted for the defense of West Point in 1780, and have but a partial record of those who served at Bunker Hill. Much of this service will undoubtedly be found later. Since the publication of the second of these collections, however, the number of soldiers as then given has been considerably added to, and from present records we find that Newmarket Officered the Army to the extent of one Lieutenant-Colonel, one Adjutant, seven Captains, eight Lieutenants, two Ensigns, ten Sergeants, and eleven Corporals, and furnished in all one hundred and thirty men.
